

## The 24th Annual Canadian Open Hickory Championship Summary The Legends GCC - August 7/8/9/10/11, 2023

Once again a wonderful hickory golf week! Great weather all 5 days (no wild fire smoke!) and a wonderfully diverse group of 94 players from Florida, Texas, Washington state, Mexico, Ontario, Saskatchewan, British Columbia and of course Alberta. First timers to this event quickly find that the Canadian Open Hickory Championship is much more than just a competition....It's an event where you make new friends, renew old acquaintances, have a "wee nip" of Hawke's Birdie Juice, tell a few tales and oh, yes, play a lot of golf!

This year we had two pre-tournament road trips to local golf courses. Each year we choose two different courses on the Monday and Tuesday to get to know new players to the

Monday Aug 7 The pre-tournament road trip to Goose Hummock just north of Edmonton was a great way to start off the week with 40 golfers. Good weather and tough greens were the order of the day - everyone got LOTS of practice putting!

Tuesday Aug 8 The pre-tournament road trip with another 40 golfers was to The Ranch, just west of Edmonton. There was evidence that the putting practice from the day before paid dividends with the traditional loonie wager between Lorne Emery and Bill Southall going Bill's way.



Wednesday Aug 9 featured the popular 4-person scramble this year with 21 teams. This event really marks the beginning of the tournament because you get to play the tournament course, meet new players, pony up some cash and scrape any residual rust off your hickory game. Friday Aug 11 Championship Friday dawned with sunny skies and little wind. 94 players vied for the top spots in the 27 hole Canadian Open Championship with triple shotguns on the Champions, Old Hickory

and Traditions 9s. After the morning Champions shotgun, the Legends hosted a pizza lunch in the Clubhouse and followed with group photos on the putting green.

After 27 holes, the Open Division was won by Ben Plaunt taking the trophy from last years winner, brother Ken Plaunt with a 36, 39, 36 score on the 3 nines. Along with the trophy goes the Canadian Open Hickory Championship flag from the last hole.





The highly competitive Senior Division featured a first time winner - Faron Hermanson shooting a 37, 39, 39 ...we should have known we were in tough when he showed up with his own golf car! Faron eked out a victory over Rob Taylor by 1 shot and Chris Ream by 2. Rick O'Donnell, Vaughn Perusse and Kenn Looten rounded out the top 6.

The Ladies Division was won by repeat winner Fran Zinger.

The First Nations award went to repeat winner Saskatchewan's Dave Racette. Dave's name along with past First Nations winners will be featured on a plaque with a stunning head dress encased in a glass cabinet featured in the Legends room of the clubhouse.

The Chinese Hickory champion award went to first year young gun, Vince Louge.





Following the final round, Ron and Edwin hosted a BBQ and awards ceremony in the clubhouse. It was a gathering of the hickory players coupled with the annual Legends Honoree ceremony. Each year the Legends

honors an Alberta resident that has made significant contributions to golf in Alberta. This years honoree was Garry Meyer. Garry, a life member of the APGA. As a former PGA Golf Professional who holds the distinction of being the youngest PGA head professional in golf history, had the opportunity to compete against Arnold Palmer, Gary Player Isao Aoki and a host of other Professionals His engaging Auctioneering style has found him all over North America raising funds for numerous Golf Charity Classic's and more such as Alice Coopers "Rock & Roll Golf Classic", Craig Simpson's "Never Say Never" Golf Classic, Edmonton Oilers Alumni and "Al Hamilton & Friend's Invitational" just to name a few. Garry's unique ability to capture and engage his audiences have raised millions of dollars for Edmonton Oilers, Edmonton



Eskimos, CIBC, Cystic Fibrosis and many more. Garry well deserves his place among the Legends honorees.




